Lesson 8

Materials:

- Non-transparent plastic cups (8)
- One small object that will fit under a cup
- Permanent or dry-erase marker
- Small pom poms
- Tongs or plastic tweezers
- Muffin tin liners
- Old sock
- Beans or rice
- Chalk or blue painter's tape
- Sea Shapes, by Suse MacDonald
- Worksheet 8

Daily Opening Routine:

- Continue routine activities.
- Have the child recite "The Shape Poem."

Shape Poem

Make a triangle with corners three,

(Hold thumbs together with index fingers pointed above.)

Make a circle no corners to see,

(Round out index fingers and thumbs.)

Make a rectangle with corners four,

(Bring index fingers to an inch above thumbs.)

Turn around and make some more!

- Have the child recite the unit verse: God made the stars (Genesis 1:16).
 - Before bedtime, have the child locate stars in the sky.

Language Arts:

- Read Sea Shapes.
 - Have the child identify the shapes found in sea animals.
 - Discuss the sea animal characteristics (fins, tails, mouth, eyes, color, etc.).
 - Have the child describe the habitats of the sea animals (water, sand, plants, etc.).
- Play ABC Search.
 - Write a capital or lower-case letter on each of the eight non-transparent plastic cups: Nn, Rr, Aa, Ll.
 - While your child covers his eyes, hide an object under one of the cups.
 - Have him search for the object by calling out a letter on a cup.
 - Continue playing until he finds the hidden object.
 - * Variation: Use other letters your child knows or is attempting to learn.
- Worksheet 8: Have the child color the shapes according to the color words.
 - * Challenge: Have the child cut out large paper shapes and make the hot air balloon on the floor.

Math:

- Have the child practice counting sets of objects.
 - Provide the child with small pom poms and a set of tongs or plastic tweezers.
 - Write a numeral 1-5 in the bottom of muffin tin liners.
 - Have the child pick up pom poms using the tongs or tweezers and make a corresponding set.














- Have the child identify the shape of the pom poms and muffin tin liners.
- Have the child identify the color of the pom poms and muffin tin liners.

Physical Education:

- Play hopscotch.
 - Draw a hopscotch game board on the concrete with chalk or in the house with blue painter's tape.
 - Each player makes his own game marker. (Players may also use a rock as a game marker.)
 - Fill the toe of an old sock with beans or rice.
 - Tie it tightly with string.
 - Draw his own face on the sock.
 - Trim the extra sock off below the string.
 - This is the game marker. Players cannot hop on other players' game markers.
 - Label the squares with shapes.
 - The first player throws his marker onto the first square.
 - The player must call out the name of the shape in the square.
 - He must hop on one foot over that square to the double squares.
 - On double squares, he must land with one foot in each square.
 - He hops to the last square, turns around, and hops back the same way.
 - If a player steps on a line, loses his balance, or misses a square, his turn is over.
 - The marker stays on the board, and the next player takes a turn.
 - If a game marker is in a square, the players may not hop in that square.
 - If a player hops through the board successfully, he picks up his marker
 - and tosses it to the second square.
 - If the marker lands on a line or in the wrong square, the player's turn is over.
 - Continue until one player successfully completes the entire game board.
