Lesson 93

Materials:

- Small paper clips
- Plastic, toy digger truck
- Cardboard
- Golf tee
- Five water bottles
- Color cubes (one inch)
- Non-standard unit of measurement: graham crackers, paper clips, or craft sticks
- Digger, Dozer, Dumper, by Hope Vestergaard
- Worksheet 93

Daily Opening Routine:

- Continue routine activities.
- Say "Five Construction Vehicles" with your child.

Five construction vehicles on a builder's site,

Digging and pushing with all their might.

Along came (child's name) with a hard hat one day,

Climbed one of the vehicles and drove it away.

Continue with other verses:

Four construction vehicles...

Three construction vehicles...

Two construction vehicles...

One construction vehicle...

Language Arts/Social Studies/Character Development:

- Read Digger, Dozer, Dumper. Discuss the construction vehicles and the jobs each one does.
 - Garbage Truck
 - Dump Truck
 - Backhoe
 - Excavator
 - Bulldozer
 - Cement Mixer
 - Steamroller
 - Forklift
 - Have the child describe how the construction vehicles worked hard to do their best and complete the work for which they are responsible.
 - Have the child describe how he can do his best with work he does (daily chores, school work, etc.).
- Teach the sound "d" as in daddy. (Try to only say the pure consonant sound, without a strong "uh" sound after it.)
 - Say the sound and have the child repeat it.
 - Have the child say this alliterative tongue-twister: "Digger dared Dumper to drop the dirt on Dozer."
 - Help the child make other tongue twisters. (Possible words: dog, duck, doll, drum, door, dinosaur, dig, dot, dress, dance)
 - Review the **d** sound with your child at various times throughout the day.


- Brown liquid watercolor paint
- Shaving cream
- Liquid white glue
- Dry erase marker

- Review letter sounds.
 - Write the letters on a large piece of cardboard: m, s, f, z, a, n, r, l, v, e, d.
 - Say a letter.
 - Have the child hammer a golf tee into the cardboard on top of the given letter.
 - Have the child say the sound of the letter.
 - Have the child say a word beginning with the letter.
 - Continue with other letters.
- Worksheet 93: Play the A-Z Game.
 - Game Preparation:
 - Cut out the spinner and game pieces on the dotted lines.
 - ◆ To make each game piece stand, fold on the solid line.
 - * A small paper clip may be clipped to the base for support.
 - Game Instructions:
 - Each player chooses a game piece and places it at the start.
 - Player one holds a paper clip with the tip of a pencil in the center of the spinner and spins the paper clip.
 - The player moves forward to the next colored-space indicated by the spinner.
 - If a player lands on a street sign, he must do the following:
 - U-turn: Go back to the start.
 - Stop: Miss a turn.
 - Yield: Switch places with another player.
 - * Extension: Discuss the meaning of the road signs when posted on a road.
 - U-turn: The turning of a vehicle in a U-shaped course to travel in the opposite direction.
 - Stop: Drivers must come to a complete stop and make sure the intersection or railroad crossing is clear of pedestrians and vehicles before continuing.
 - Yield: Drivers must slow down and yield their right to other vehicles and pedestrians approaching from different directions.
 - Players alternate turns.
 - The first player to reach the finish wins.
 - * Extension:
 - Players must identify the letter on the space where they land.
 - Players must say the sound of the letter on the space where they land.
 - Players must say a word beginning with the letter on the space where they land.

Math:

- Have the child practice number word recognition.
 - Gather five water bottles.
 - Write the numerals 15 and 16 on two of the water bottle lids. (Use dry erase marker so the numerals can be changed.)
 - Write the number words fifteen and sixteen on the water bottles.
 - Write three other numerals and corresponding number words on the other three lids and bottles.
 - Randomly arrange the lids and the bottles in front of the child.
 - Have him select a lid and twist it on the matching water bottle.
 - After he can correctly identify all of the numerals and number words, erase the numerals and words.
 - Write other numerals and number words on the lids and bottles.
 - Repeat the activity.
 - * Challenge: Use ten water bottles and lids.

- Show the child how to measure the length of an object.
 - Have the child measure objects using color cubes. (If you do not have color cubes, cut out the squares on the bottom of worksheet 93a.)
 - Place cubes side-by-side along the length of an object.



- → Have the child count the number of cubes. (six)
- Have the child measure objects of different sizes using another non-standard unit of measurement like graham crackers, paper clips, or craft sticks.
- Worksheet 93a, part A: Have the child measure each road using one-inch color cubes. Remind the child that the cubes must be placed at the beginning of the road, without spaces between the cubes.
 - Road 1: 4 cubes
 - Road 2: 6 cubes
 - Road 3: 3 cubes
 - Road 4: 7 cubes
 - * Since each color cube is one inch long, the road lengths can also be stated using inches.
 - Road 1: 4 inches
 - Road 2: 6 inches
 - Road 3: 3 inches
 - Road 4: 7 inches
- Worksheet 93a, part B: Have the child trace the path each construction vehicle drives around the cones.
 Then have him count the cones.

Art:

- Have the child make digger tracks.
 - Mix brown liquid watercolor paint, shaving cream, and liquid white glue to make puff paint.
 - Drop several blobs onto a sheet of construction paper.
 - Have the child push a plastic, toy digger through the paint creating tire tracks.
 - Have the child lower the digger attachment and create additional tracks.


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
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Part A: Measure each road.
